We seek to inspire our members to take action to support native organizations in our community.



Approval of Jan. Meeting Minutes

Possible impact of a second Trump term on SPS

1. Funding Risks

- **Federal Education Cuts:** Potential reductions to Title I and special education funding.
- Shift to Vouchers/Charters: Increased support for private school vouchers may divert resources from public schools.

2. Immigration Enforcement

- **Student Safety Concerns:** Heightened immigration enforcement may increase anxiety for families with undocumented members.
- **Impact on Enrollment:** Fear of deportation could lead to lower school attendance among immigrant students.

3. Equity Challenges

- **Civil Rights Enforcement:** Potential rollback of Title IX protections for marginalized groups, including LGBTQ+ students and students of color.
- **Disproportionate Impact:** Budget cuts and policy shifts may disproportionately affect low-income and minority students.

What's the Department of Education's role in local schools?


The Dept. of Education has a broad range of responsibilities but not a lot of control over schools. The department does not set curriculum or policies at individual schools or districts.

The department's 2024 budget included \$20.5 billion for Title I schools and \$16.8 billion for special education. For the 2024-25 fiscal year, Seattle Public Schools said it received less than 7% of its revenue from the Federal government. 63% came from the state.

Local Advocacy Needed

- **Protecting Public Education:** Advocate for sustained funding and inclusive policies.
- **Supporting All Families:** Emphasize community support for immigrant and vulnerable populations.





Partner Updates Principal Marshall


Dr. Marshall Principal Update





- Annual campaign funds in account: \$187,393
- ~16.5K in matching funds that we need confirmation for Annual Campaign; expecting matching funds for library fundraiser and need to differentiate (emailed Anthony)
- Budget has \$5K unallocated. The following are unexpected expenses:
 - Overdue taxes from 2020 \$239
 - Prior year expenses paid in current year -\$3,366 (buses, field trip)
 - Multicultural night \$450
 - [ASK] FIN \$300
 - If all of these are part of \$5K budget, we have balance of \$645


Advocacy Updates




